#### Facts about Stalking

- 3.4 million people over the age of 18 are stalked each year.
- 17% of Native American women have been stalked.
- 1 in 4 victims report being stalked through some form of technology (cyberstalking).
- Stalkers can buy surveillance software and hardware for as little as \$30 and can easily track their victims' every move on a computer.
- 10% of victims report being monitored with a global positioning systems (GPS), and 8% report being monitored through video or digital cameras or listening devices.
- 2/3 of stalkers pursue their victim at least once a week.
- 78% of stalkers use more than one approach.
- Weapons are used to harm or threaten victims in 1 of every 5 cases.
- Almost 1/3 of stalkers have stalked before.
- Intimate partner stalkers frequently approach their victim, and their behaviors escalate quickly.
- 3 in 4 stalking victims are stalked by someone they know.
- 30% of stalking victims are stalked by a current or former intimate partner.
- Persons ages 18-24 years experience the highest rate of stalking.
- 11% of stalking victims have been stalked for 5 years or more.
- 46% of stalking victims experience at least one unwanted contact per week.

### What is Stalking?

Stalking is characterized by willfully, maliciously, and repeatedly harassing, following or causing credible threat to another individual in an attempt to frighten or harm them.

### Safety when you're being stalked

- Inform a trusted neighbor about the situation and a description of the stalker (if possible, a picture) as well as any vehicles they may be driving.
- Let your landlord/manager know and give them the same information.
- Have coworkers screen your calls and visitors.
- Try to stay in public areas as much as possible.
- Install dead bolts and change locks if there is any reason the stalker could get your key.
- Have adequate outdoor lighting so there are no dark places for the stalker to hide.
- Change your route frequently.
- Treat all threats as legitimate.
- Get an unlisted phone number, but do not disconnect the one the stalker has.
- Limit time spent walking or walk with a friend.
- Keep your vehicle locked and ask for an escort at work to walk you to your vehicle.
- Keep a journal noting date/time/location of all incidents.
- Save all letters, gifts, and anything else from the stalker.
- Record indirect contact with the stalker through friends or family members in your journal.
- Take pictures if possible anytime the stalker follows you or drives by.

#### If you are in imminent danger:

• Locate a safe place to go - family/friend's house (if stalker doesn't know the location), shelter, public areas.

If it is not possible to leave, call local law enforcement or 911.

## **Stalking Behaviors**

- Calls frequently (sometimes saying nothing or hangs up)
- Waits outside or inside places you are
- Watches you from a distance
- Follows you
- Sends letters and/or emails
- Shows up uninvited
- Sends unwanted gifts or flowers
- Leaves written messages or objects for you

## **5** Categories of Stalking

#### Simple Obsession

- A prior relationship exists between the victim and the stalker
- Acquaintance, neighbor, customer, professional relationship, dating
- The stalking behavior begins after the relationship has gone "sour" or the offending individual perceives some mistreatment
- The stalker begins a campaign to either rectify the "relationship" or to seek some type of retribution

#### Love Obsession

- Obsessed with being "in love" with the victim
- Stalking becomes a way to make the victim realize the stalker's existence
- Celebrity stalkers

#### Erotomania

- Idealized as romantic love and spiritual union rather than sexual attraction
- The object of affection is usually of a higher status and can be a complete stranger
- "Rescues" the victim from an imagined danger

#### Vengeance/Terrorism

- Attempt to elicit a particular response or a change of behavior from their own victim
- Stalkers seek only to punish their victims for some wrong they perceive the victim has done to them to "get even"

Example: Employee who was fired may stalk their employer

#### Cyberstalking

- The use of the internet or other electronic means to stalk someone
- The use of information and communications technology to harass someone
- Cyberstalkers meet or target their victims by using chat rooms, and online communities such as MySpace or Facebook
- Some victims can be stalked physically
